Headteacher's News

Last Monday Highlands School submitted data to the Department for Education for the first term of this year (September 2019 – December 2019). All schools submit data three times a year, at the end of each term. Two of the areas we submitted data on were exclusions and attendance. This has allowed us to review the impact of the changes we have made to attendance at Highlands and to assess the impact of the focus we have had over the last year on behaviour, particularly during social time.

Attendance

In September 2019 the school launched new attendance policies and procedures, appointed an attendance officer and has used assemblies, tutor time and parental contact to promote good attendance. I am pleased to say that our attendance for the first term this year has improved on last year. Overall school attendance is measured by two metrics, overall absence and persistent absence (PA). A student is persistently absent if their absence figure is above 10%. As you will see from the table below our overall attendance has improved. Our PA figure is significantly improved compared to this time last year and much better than national. I would like to thank all students, parents and staff (particularly the pastoral team) for bringing about this improvement.

Behaviour and exclusions

We have taken incremental steps since September 2018 to improve school behaviour during social time. Following the mobile phone ban in September 2018 we used CCTV to hold to account students who were littering and leaving their plates and dishes in the canteen, as a result the corridors and canteens are much tidier then they were. This year we increased the lunchtime supervision responsibilities of the senior leadership team and we also restructured the school day so that years 8-11 were at lunch together so they could be supervised more easily. From January this year we closed off certain parts of the building during break and lunch to further aid close supervision of students. These measures, along with a focus on behaviour standards in assemblies and in conversations with students and parents has seen a marked reduction in our exclusion figures. Overall, exclusions over the past 12 months (January 2019 - January 2020) were 36% lower than the preceding 12 months (January 2018 - January 2019). Making sure students understand our expectations and that there are consequences if they do not meet them helps secure good behaviour in schools and we will continue to promote positive behaviour at Highlands. I would like to thank parents, carers, students and staff for supporting the systems. Although our exclusions figures are improved and behaviour at break and lunches is better, we can still make further improvements to behaviour at Highlands. The launch of our new behaviour policy later this year will help us do this.

A reminder that Year 8 Options Evening is on Wednesday 5th February. This evening is being held to make sure that the GCSE options process is clear to parents, carers and students and to give students the opportunity to discuss GCSE options subject with the staff delivering them. Parents, carers and students should arrive at 6pm The evening will end at 7:30pm.

Year 8 parents' evening is on Wednesday 12th February. This will be the point at which GCSE option preferences will be submitted to staff. All year 8 parents should attend.

Economics in practice - Students learn the important role that the Bank of England has in all of our lives.

On Wednesday 29th January, as part of the Highlands Pathways Programme, we were fortunate to have a visit from Jill May, Member of the Prudential Regulation Committee at The Bank of England to talk about her executive career and about the challenges and future of the financial world in the years to come.

A select group of 6th Form students studying Economics and Business Studies were chosen to attend an enlightening hour and it was great for students to have an insight into the workings, priorities and future of such a significant and prestigious institution.

Jill talked about the history and role of the Bank of England in financial services, how bank notes are printed and circulated - that the highest denomination of a non-circulating bank note is of £100,000,000 referred to as the Titan, and most topical - how climate change can create financial risk.

The highlight of the session was when the students got to take away shredded $\pounds 20$ note BBQ briquettes! When notes come out of circulation, they are shredded and then turned into reusable products – each briquette contains nearly a $\pounds 1000$. Some students had the idea of trying to piece them all back together – good luck with that!



The talk was followed with a Q&A session, allowing students to have a conversation around issues important to them such as the state of the UK's economy, future jobs and how Brexit might impact the country.
