

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
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SIXTH FORM OPEN EVENING

We are supporting students in year 11 as they make their choices about post-16 options. We would like to invite all year 11 students, parents and carers to our sixth form virtual open evening, next week on Wednesday 18th November, 6:30pm. Registration in advance is required and can be accessed on our website **HERE**. Last year our sixth form was oversubscribed and we had to turn some students away from courses; we prioritise Highlands students but we need them to apply early so we can make sure we are running the right courses. Please attend the virtual open evening to make sure you are fully informed about the process.

We will be launching our sixth form open evening micro-site on the morning of the virtual open evening, November 18th. However, you can get a sense of what our sixth form is about by having a look at last year's virtual sixth form induction site that we made for the new year 12 students as they joined the sixth form in September 2020.

CHRISTMAS HAMPER APPEAL

We are aware that with the current circumstances many households are finding themselves in a very difficult position running up to the festive period. We know some families found half term week challenging and are concerned about the impact of the Christmas holiday. The Highlands School community wants to help by providing food hampers for those families. If you feel your family would benefit from one of these hampers, please complete the online form attached HERE and return by **Friday 27th November** at the latest.

To fulfill these requests we need the help of the Highlands School Community!

We would ask that, if you are able, you donate food suitable for a hamper for a family in need this Christmas. We then hope to make up Christmas hampers to distribute the week prior to the holidays. We are looking for items such as:



Non perishable food such as: tinned beans and pulses; soup; tinned vegetables; cereal; tinned pies; tinned meat and fish; rice; pasta; long life custard; sponge pudding; rice pudding; biscuits; crackers; tinned fruit.



Christmas items such as: chocolate selection boxes/chocolates; christmas puddings; christmas themed cakes; christmas crackers; mince pies.



Drinks such as: squash; long life fruit juice; hot chocolate; tea and coffee; UHT milk.

Also, we are looking for monetary donations to help complete the hampers. You can do this via ParentPay - just look for the Christmas Hamper Appeal. Please make all donations by **Friday 4th December**.

We will collect food donations from the 30th November - 4th December at the beginning of the students' school day. Please put items in a bag so students can deposit them in a collection box as they enter the school building. There will also be a box in the sixth form area for year 12s and 13s to make food donations.

The upcoming holidays are a great opportunity for the Highlands community to come together and support one another. We know that you as a community will want to help support our appeal and help all families look forward to the holiday season. With your help we can really make a difference!





LAMDA EXAMS

Students who took their LAMDA (London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art) solo acting exams in July, received their certificates recently. All the students had moved to online tuition during the spring lockdown, preparing for exams ranging from grade 3 to grade 6 (bronze award). We are very proud that every one of them achieved a pass with distinction. Well done!

The classes, which form an optional part of the drama department's extended curriculum, are running 'face to face' sessions again this year on Wednesday afternoons. As well as building confidence and communication skills, they also provide globally recognised and Ofqual approved qualifications and UCAS points (grades 6 to 8). PART 3

The Last Post

The Last Post is used at Commonwealth military funerals, and ceremonies commemorating those who have been killed in war. It is often followed by The Rouse. Its use in Remembrance Day ceremonies in Commonwealth nations has two generally unexpressed purposes: the first is an implied summoning of the spirits of the fallen to the cenotaph, the second is to symbolically end the day, so that the period of silence before the "Rouse" is blown becomes in effect a ritualised night vigil.

TOPIC OF THE WEEK

Options at 16

If you're in year 11, you should have started planning about what you want to do after you leave school. What you can do after Year 11 depends on things like where you live, what kind of grades you're likely to get, what you're interested in and what kind of environment you want to learn in. Until the age of 18 you have to stay in some form of education but you can choose from a range of options.

SIXTH FORM & SIXTH FORM COLLEGES

Sixth forms are often attached to a school and sometimes sixth forms are completely separate from any other schools, and teach students from lots of different places. The courses available are mainly a level but some do include vocational qualifications like a BTEC. A levels or equivalent level 3 courses offer a great route into higher education and employment. **Applications are now open and deadlines are by mid January 2021 at the latest.**

FURTHER EDUCATION COLLEGES

Offer a huge range of courses that can help at every stage of life from Level 1 courses through to degrees and professional qualifications. Colleges offer a range of full-time and part-time courses related to a broad employment area such as sports, engineering, media, health and social care etc that can lead to a specific job. **Virtual events have started and applications are open-deadlines are usually end of March 2021.**

APPRENTICESHIPS

Offer a way to learn on the job whilst working for an employer, building up knowledge and skills, gaining qualifications and earning money at the same time. If you have a job sector or career in mind then an apprenticeship can be a great choice. **Applications are all advertised all year round. Ensure you have an up to date CV.**

EMPLOYMENT/VOLUNTARY WORK

If you do choose the work/voluntary work route, this will involve you working towards a nationally recognised qualification as well as being employed, self employed or volunteering for 20 hours or more a week.

HOW TO CHOOSE

Think about how each option fits with your other GCSEs. Does a subject go well with your other choices? Or does a subject provide a welcome change?

If you're taking lots of science and maths based subjects, it can be good to include one choice which is essay based.



A good place to start planning your post-16 options is to think of these three questions.

Who am I? (What qualifications, skills, and interests do I have?) Where am I going? (What would I like to be doing in 5 years time – job, living away from home, etc?) How do I get there? (What course, training or future job is likely to get me where I want to go?) Of course, at 16, young people may not know the answers to all these questions, but now is the time to start exploring information about careers, jobs and courses. If you really aren't sure about what you want to do in the future then 'stay broad' - do a broad range of subjects so that you can decide later!

Get advice from people who know you well (like parents/carers & teachers). All year 11 students are supported with post 16 applications and have a 1:1 careers meeting followed by a careers action plan.
