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## YEAR 10

#### **YEAR 10 ASSESSMENTS**

Highlands School would like to thank all parents and carers for your continued support throughout the assessment period. Your child concluded their GCSE assessments in two of their GCSE subjects last week and we were very impressed with their behaviour, conduct and attitude throughout that time. There is now curriculum time available in the option subjects that have been completed. Some of this will be used to deliver relationships and sex education (RSE) and some of this time will be used to prepare and assess your child in the GCSE / BTEC subjects they will take at the end of Year 11.

As you know your child is still studying their remaining GCSEs and it is important that they have an opportunity to sit an end of year assessment in those subjects too. The reason for this is that it helps us and them understand how well they are performing so that we know what support to put in place for them in September. Secondly, they are entitled to practice GCSE papers in standardised conditions in all of their subjects, in preparation for their GCSEs next year.

We understand that this has been a difficult year for your child. School closure has meant that they have missed out on some face to face teaching and we understand that this may make some feel anxious and worried about how they will fare in next year's GCSE exams. Whilst we do not know whether or what adaptations the exam boards may make to the examination process next year, we do know that it is essential we prepare your child for every eventuality. Therefore it is important that we run the assessments this year as we usually would do, but that we do so in a way that does not overwhelm your child or disrupt their learning time in those subjects.

So that this can happen your child will sit their assessment in existing lesson slots in the option subject they completed this year. The assessment period will begin on the 8th June 2021 and conclude on the week beginning the 6th July 2021. This plan avoids some of the anxiety that can come with a full week of examinations in the sports hall and doesn't disrupt their existing curriculum time. It also means that their assessments are spaced apart, with no more than three assessments per week. This means students have time in lessons and after school to revise.

The time table included on the next page shows which assessments your child will be sitting each week. If they do not study one of the option subjects blocked they will be revising in lessons. Where there may be a clash, for example if they study French and Spanish, they will do the second assessment during P6 that day. We met students in year 10 this morning to explain this and we will communicate all the information to students in advance in writing. Revision material for the first week of assessments will be provided to all students next week for them to study in their year 10 entry option subject.

# IMPORTANT

### BEWARE PARENTS AND STUDENTS: KIDNAPPING ATTEMPT AROUND ENFIELD

This week police officers in Enfield carried out enquiries to find a 10-year-old boy, who was reported missing on the morning of Tuesday 18th May. The boy was located and returned home on the same day.

Police are aware of reports circulating that the boy may have potentially been abducted. Officers are continuing to conduct extensive enquiries to establish the circumstances of the alleged abduction and whether any offence has occurred.

Officers are also aware of reports of a suspicious incident that occurred on Saturday, 15 May in the Enfield Lock area involving a white van. Officers traced the occupants of the van and arrested a man and a woman on suspicion of attempted child abduction. The man and woman have been bailed to return on a date in mid-June.

At this time police are not linking reports of the alleged abduction of the 10-year-old boy and reports of the suspicious incident in Enfield Lock involving the white van. As such, officers are continuing to investigate the two matters separately.

Detective Chief Superintendent Treena Fleming, in charge of policing for Enfield and Haringey, said: "I would like to reassure my local community that we take all allegations of this nature very seriously; we understand the concerns and strength of feeling, particularly amongst parents, when we hear of potential incidents involving children.

"I am aware, understandably, that there has been a great deal of coverage and concern expressed on social media around these two incidents but I would respectfully ask the local community to allow us to complete a full and thorough investigation around both matters. This will ensure that we are able to fully understand what may have occurred.

"If I do have any concerns around public safety, I will ensure that our residents and communities are made aware of my concerns, should this be necessary. When I know the full circumstances of what has happened in these alleged incidents, I will be sure to update the community.

"You will continue to see officers out and about across Enfield and I would encourage the public to speak with them about any concerns they may have. I would also suggest those living in the area to follow the @MPSEnfield account on Twitter, which is used by officers to engage with the community.

"Child kidnappings or abductions are incredibly rare and I must stress that we are still establishing the full facts around these cases to determine whether any offences have been committed. However, if anyone sees anything suspicious, or has any concerns, they should **dial 999** in an emergency or **call 101** in a non-emergency."

As part of the extended curriculum, the Drama department at Highlands School offer optional LAMDA (London Academy of Music and Dramatic Arts) examinations. These popular classes are open to all students who are keen to develop their acting skills and/or build confidence as well as gain a valuable qualification.

LAMDA exams are internationally recognised qualifications. They are graded according to age and experience with higher grades carrying UCAS points.

Classes at Highlands are run by an external provider on a peripatetic basis and take place on Wednesday afternoons after timetabled lessons have finished (see timetable, below). Highlands students benefit from an extremely favourable school rate of £10 per week, payable termly or monthly\*. Students are taught in small groups in preparation for solo or combined examinations which usually take place once a year in the summer term. Students at Highlands have enjoyed great success in the LAMDA exams with 100% of last year's cohort achieving a Pass with Distinction, despite tutoring having taken place on line for most of the spring and summer term.

#### **FREE TRIAL**

We would like to offer current Year 7 students who are interested in taking the Solo or Combined Acting exam next year an opportunity to try a free trial class on 26th May 2021 (see times below).

# PARKING

#### PARKING AROUND HIGHLANDS SCHOOL

#### Responsible parking

We have received several complaints from local residents about inconsiderate or dangerous parking by parents when they drop off students at either Grange Park or Highlands school. Parking restrictions are in place on the roundabout area between the two schools. Enfield council do regularly patrol with cameras and issue fixed penalty notices in the post. Please do not drop off students on the zebra crossing area. We all want students to arrive safely at school, so please can parents ensure they park considerately and safely. The majority of our students should be able to walk to and from school each day or use public transport to complete their journeys. When it is necessary for any other arrangement, we remind parents of their obligations to park responsibly and ensure the safety of others.

- The roundabout immediately between Highlands school and Grange Park school is a designated public highway with yellow lines restricting parking at the start and end of school; this area is routinely patrolled by enforcement cars with CCTV and should not be used as a waiting area.
- The zebra crossing has zig-zag lines marking the approach and it is illegal to park on these as doing so would block the view of approaching traffic or force over-taking, therefore we kindly ask parents not to use the crossing as a drop off or pick up point.
- The end of Lonsdale Drive has yellow line restrictions, this is to ensure that traffic can turn safely and that busses can navigate the junction; please do not park in this section of the road as it narrows the width and inevitably blocks the flow of traffic.
- If you must use a car to transport your child we ask that you make arrangements to drop off or pick up at a suitable location away from the school, for example in the car park outside Sainsbury's or at a point a short walk from the entrance.

With the cooperation of our community we can ensure a safe travel environment around the school for all of our students.
