### FROM THE HEADTEACHER

This week was a challenging one at Highlands as an increase in COVID-19 cases (and suspected cases) started to impact our ability to keep the school fully open and we asked year 9 to work at home for two days. Asking students to work at home is a last resort and we try to employ external supply teachers where we can. We also take multiple classes in the same year group, studying the same subject, to the main hall so a subject specialist teacher can teach them all at once. However, this week it was hard to find supply teachers as many schools are short staffed, we even had one of our supply teachers call in sick on Friday. When we feel we cannot open the school I communicate with our Chair of Governors and the Director of Public Health and Director of Education at the London Borough of Enfield and we inform parents and staff. Thank you all for your support during this challenging period.

Next week we have some Christmas events at school that we are looking forward to. On Monday 13th at lunchtime is the Winter Wonderland bake sale. This is run by our students. We hope students and staff will support it. On Tuesday it is Christmas jumper day and Christmas dinner in the canteen. Further details of Christmas jumper day can be found below.

On Friday 17th December we will end term as we always do with students having special Christmas celebration assemblies and an early finish. At these assemblies students will find out who is winning the inter house competition and we will give out end of term awards. Students in years 8-13 will be dismissed at 11:50am. 



My thoughts on this article are that Covid-19 has changed a lot people's eating habits. Since Covid-19 appear restaurants closed down and people use spending more time at home. 43% of people said that they are worried about the extra cost of providing food for their household. The rises to 58% of those aged 35-44 and 54% of those aged 25-34. The 47% of people are enjoying cooking and spending time with their families, some of them are saying that they improved their cooking skills. Also 48% are throwing away less food and they are using the leftovers for dinner. Now only 29% are buying takeaway and going to restaurant (after they opened them). Covid-19 has created a massive shock to the way households value food and is likely to lead to some new behaviours some of which could cut food waste.

# CHEMISTRY IN ACTION CONFERENCE

Year 12 Chemistry students attended the Chemistry in Action Conference on 29th November. A few of the students wrote a review on the conference which is shown below.

## What's it all about?

The trip was a visit to The Emmanuel Centre where our school and multiple others were invited to join a series of Chemistry in Action lectures. These lectures were full of information about modern day technologies, such as nanotechnology and its recent origin. It also contained vital information about the COVID-19 vaccine and its distribution around the world, including shortages, technological issues and transportation.

## Lectures and interactive talks:

Throughout the day we had multiple lectures and interactive talks. These consisted of fascinating topics such as the properties of water, vaccines and medicine and the treating of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) with antiretroviral therapy (ART), and tips on how to succeed in exams. These talks were performed by multiple professors from universities around the country. Throughout the lectures, we had a chance to answer questions on the topic interactively and check our understanding.

## Conclusion:

In conclusion the day to the Emmanuel centre was great and full of enthusiastic chats and lectures such as the origin of anaesthetics from fever tree bark. It helped in the understanding of topics further and it also gave us an insight on how to study efficiently and effectively as well as how questions should be answered in exams and looking for key information in questions. There were also many intriguing practicals that showed us the properties of water, explaining why ice floats on liquid water, and the flammability of hydrogen gas; relating to over a century ago with the Hindenburg blimp disaster in Germany. Overall, the trip was an interesting and amazing experience.



# CHEMISTRY IN ACTION CONFERENCE

The Chemistry in action trip was very informative and insightful. The class was able to listen to multiple different lectures that talked about topics outside our curriculum, this consisted of: vaccine cold chains, how chemistry controls biology, nanotechnology, a demonstration with liquid nitrogen and many other demonstrations. We were also able to listen to an AQA chemistry examiner, who gave us access to many tips and tricks that will be useful in our A-level exams. But my favourite lecture was learning about the vaccination cold chain and Dr Asel Sartbaeva from the University of Bath explained her solution to this, using silica to create a tailored shell around the vaccine and prevent the denaturation of proteins. This trip was fascinating, and I encourage any future year 12 students to attend it.

Nuffield Research Placements (NRPs) are engaging, real-life research or development projects, where talented Year 12 (or equivalent) students are placed at the heart of a UK host organisation.

In 2021, we supported over 1,000 students to begin their placements right across the UK working and collaborating alongside STEM or STEM-related professionals to study topics such as:

- COVID-19 misinformation on Twitter
- black hole 'top trumps'
- plant pathology to feed the world
- bioinformatic tools and breast cancer mutations
- how underground geology can support net-zero carbon emission goals.

A teacher from Bishopbriggs Academy, stated that for one of her students:

## Students can take part in a placement at no extra cost


Travel costs are reimbursed, and the majority of eligible students also receive a £200 bursary.



## Extra curricular Clubs

Dear Parent or Carer,

This letter covers the concerns around the use of TikTok by children.

I would like to share with you that there have been a number of incidents in various schools where school children have been posting malicious information about school staff on social media platforms such as TikTok. On occasions this has included falsely accusing staff of criminal offences involving children.

This is very distressing to staff and their families a behaviour that is not acceptable. Please may I respectfully ask you as parents and carers for us to work together to remind your child that this is a criminal offence under the Malicious Communications Act 1988:

Where a person sends a letter, electronic communication or article of any description which conveys a message which is indecent or grossly offensive, a threat or information which is false and known or believed to be false by the sender is a criminal offence.

If a child writes something about a member of school staff which is false or grossly offensive 'just as a bit of fun' or as a rumour and then posts it on social media – they do commit a criminal offence.

The child may then be at risk of permanently excluded and/or prosecution and risk of being criminalised resulting in a criminal record which will have an impact when they apply for a job in the future.

As your safer schools police team, we work hard with your school to avoid school children becoming excluded or criminalised, but sometimes where the level of harm or distressed caused is so severe we have little choice but to follow these routes.

The importance of sharing this communication with you is for us to work together to both educate and engage with you to avoid this situation.

Please speak to your child regarding the sensible use of social media. Please consider also using parental software to restrict to manage what they can access and monitor where appropriate. A guide can be found on line. I may also look to arrange one of our schools officers to host a virtual on line awareness session to assist you.

Although this letter is focusing on TikTok the content is relevant for other risks social media poses such as your child being at risk of being exploited, bullied, and groomed on line by criminal gangs.

If your child does genuinely suspect of anyone committing criminal offences then they must report this to either a senior staff member, or the police. You or your child can also confidentially access Childline 0800 1111 [childline.org.uk](http://childline.org.uk) or report crime anonymously via the Fearless website.
