Dear Parents and Carers,

We had a week of inter house quizzes this week, for all year groups (apart from year 10) and for our staff. We had some exciting finishes with the year 9 and 13 quizzes going down to the last question with all the teams able to win. Students participated with enthusiasm and I want to thank them all for their contributions.

The staff quiz was won by Beech, with Mr Friend captaining them to victory - well done! You can see a picture of the winning staff team on page 7.

We are at the end of the second week of the half term and we have not had a single suspension from school. This is a fantastic indication of the positive start students have made to this term. Our suspension figures are already historically low this year and we should all be proud that students are not getting caught up in serious behaviour incidents.

We were also able to analyse our attendance figures at the end of last term, again the story is very positive with student attendance being better than national averages and the average in Enfield. We want to give your children the best educational experience of any school anywhere, so we set our sights high, and we are proud that our attendance is so good, and improving. Thank you for working with us to get your children into school.

Last week I was also able to share with governors the total number of applications to join Highlands in September 2023. We had over 1500 applications for our 240 places in year 7, an increase on last year. Student numbers are falling across London so it is important that schools can fill their places. With over five times as many applications as places we have done that and we remain one of the most popular schools in north London. It is our students and you, our parents and carers, who promote our school in the wider community; thank you for helping keep our reputation so positive.

Schools Consent Project

This week, our school had the pleasure of hosting the Schools Consent Project, an organisation that works with lawyers to help teach students the legal definition of consent. They aim to normalise conversations about consent in order to safeguard young people.

During their visit, the Schools Consent Project conducted various workshops and discussions that were interactive and engaging. They used real-life scenarios and situations to teach our students about the importance of communication and consent and the different types of boundaries, how to recognise them and the importance of respecting them.

The Schools Consent Project team provided our students with practical tools and strategies that can be used to create a safe and respectful environment. Students were educated on the legal definition of consent, how to identify consent, the ages of consent, bystander intervention, the offences of rape, sexual assault and 'sexting', responding to disclosures and ways to obtain help.

Overall, the visit from the Schools Consent Project was informative and thought-provoking. Students learned that by speaking up and setting boundaries, they can help prevent situations where consent is not given or respected.

KS3: Needle by Patrice Lawrence

When Charlene loses her temper over a blanket that she hand-knitted, and stabs her foster mum's son in the hand with the knitting needle, she has to deal with the consequences.

Charlene is a demon knitter. It's the only thing she enjoys and the only thing she believes she's really good at. So when her foster mum's son destroys her latest creation, Charlene loses it and stabs him in the hand with her knitting needle. It damages a nerve and she gets sucked into the criminal justice system for assault.

Charlene's not sorry and she's never apologised to anyone in her life. But people keep telling her that if she says sorry, they'll go easier on her. Can she bring herself to say it and not mean it when her freedom is at stake?





Recommended read for KS4 from the library and English department

KS4: The Eternal Return of Clara Hart by Louise Finch

After witnessing an attempted sexual assault that leads to an accidental death at a party, a teenage boy is trapped in a time loop until he finds the courage to set the situation right.

Spencer hates Anthony's sexist jokes but he never says anything he's a mate, and Spencer doesn't have many. Then Spencer finds Anthony assaulting a drugged girl at a party. Humiliated, Clara Hart flees the house and is killed by a car on the road.

The next day starts the same way as the last - Spencer wakes up in his car, in his school uniform, all over again. Then his car is clipped, again – by Clara Hart.

So Spencer is condemned to experience the same 24 hours over and over. Caught in a loop, he tries to protect Clara and prevent the terrible events of the party. To break the spell, Spencer has to join the dots between Anthony's everyday sexism and his assault on Clara. He must find the courage to call out the toxic masculinity of his friend.
