Victoria and Albert Museum

This special occasion brought together a diverse group of students, fostering a supportive environment where they could meet deaf role models, engage in workshops, and ignite their aspirations.

The presence of deaf role models which included deaf chef Coco Briden and actress Charlotte Arrowsmith to name a few, was a pivotal aspect of Deaf Aspiration Day. Accomplished individuals from diverse backgrounds shared their personal stories, highlighting the challenges they faced and the achievements they have made. These role models served as living proof that deafness does not define one's potential. Their inspiring journeys left a lasting impact, encouraging students to believe in their abilities and pursue their dreams with confidence.

The day featured a series of engaging workshops designed to cultivate the skills and talents of the students. Through interactive activities and hands-on experiences, students developed new skills, expanded their knowledge, and discovered untapped passions.

The event fostered a strong sense of community among deaf students from different schools. It provided a safe and inclusive space for them to connect with their peers, exchange experiences, and build supportive networks.





The morning started with an assembly on post 16 pathways, including a talk from Barnet and Southgate College and the Capital City College Group (CCCG) which is the largest further education provider in London, and the third largest in the UK, with three colleges – City and Islington College (CANDI), The College of Haringey, Enfield and North East London (CONEL) and Westminster Kingsway College (WestKing) encouraging students to start their research on decision making at the next stage of their career, choosing post 16 options.

This was followed by an employability workshop run by Brightfutures, packed full of exciting activities and offering students a realistic experience of working life. The interactive content was original, current and totally relevant to today's students with a dynamic delivery style that got everyone involved.

Students were informed how to gain the top employability skills such as teamwork, communication, problem solving, leadership, self-management, reliability, and analytical skills. They practised interview skills and gained an insight into creating a first rate CV through a recruitment challenge, inspiring students to explore the bigger picture of the economy and investigate their career choices further.





Futures Day and WiseUp

Futures Day

Year 12 spent the morning planning for their Post 18 Options. Careers, university and apprenticeship preparation are an integral part of the sixth form experience at Highlands and for most of our students, university is the next step towards that journey, whilst others follow a different pathway.

In support of this day, students were offered a range of guidance seminars to help prepare for all routes, as they make choices that will shape the beginning of their independent, adult life. They attended a carousel of workshops which included making informed choices on what to consider when choosing a course and university, personal statement writing support from several universities across the UK, a finance workshop, a session on applying for higher and degree apprenticeships and an interactive Interview Skills workshop.

WiseUp

The following day, year 12 took part in the "Time Attack Challenge" run by WiseUp Team-building, the leading provider of outreach, outdoor education and inventive activity development.

Students worked in teams, starting with a round of warm up activities, designed to highlight students' individual strengths and skills, followed by a wide range of timed activities across several themed areas. Teams competed against one another as well as the clock, in challenges ranging from high energy, fast paced race style events to quick thinking memory tasks.

This event also gave students the opportunity to engage with innovative logical thinking challenges and essential skills such as communication, teamwork and application, all as important as academic ability in predicting future pathways.
