## Inspiring the next generation of space enthusiasts



Rockets for All provides young people aged 14-18 with an exciting introduction to the UK's space industry. Our students took part in engaging digital workshops led by expert role models, which were both interactive and informative, offering plenty of opportunities to ask questions.

Following the workshops, several of our year 10 students took on the challenge of designing and launching their own rockets. The task was to create a rocket that not only travelled the furthest but also ensured its passenger, 'Mx Egg,' survived the journey without cracking.

Owen's rocket launched the highest (an impressive 85 feet!), Erimione's egg was the only one that survived the launch and Elis designed the most creative rocket.

Our students thoroughly enjoyed the competition, and their enthusiasm was matched by that of Dr Len, Mr Rahman, and Mr Bradford, who were on hand to watch the thrilling launches!

Here is what a couple of our amazing year 10 rocket engineers had to say.

'During the event, the students gathered in a science classroom, where we were provided with materials and our rocket packs to make our own mini-rocket. It was competitive but also very friendly, as we all helped each other—with gluing, sticking, sharing materials, etc., making the whole experience much more relaxed and enjoyable. The competition had two aims and therefore two prizes to be awarded. One was for the rocket that flew the highest, and the second was for the rocket that could hold an egg inside it without the egg breaking. The teachers used the trackers we were supplied with to measure how high the rockets went and recorded all of the results, as well as whose egg survived the impact, on a spreadsheet.

The hardest part of the rocket-making process was researching the best ways for the rockets to fly higher and for the egg to survive. As we hadn't yet been exposed to these topics in our physics lessons, it meant we had to apply our knowledge as well as research. If the competition were run again, I'd try to use a smaller bottle so that the area the water was in was smaller, which would mean that when pumping air into it, it would be more compressed, so it would fly higher. Furthermore, I would find ways to give the competition more publicity, as many people were hesitant to join due to their friends not being in it or because they thought it wouldn't be very popular. This wasn't the case at all! The competition was extremely successful, and everyone who took part enjoyed it.' - Ermioni



'We held an exciting rocket competition on March 7th, bringing together students from different year groups. Everyone was enthusiastic about their creations, helping each other wherever possible and sharing ideas.

On the day, teams had just a few hours to design, build, and launch their rockets. The atmosphere was buzzing with excitement as we tested different designs. We had prizes for Best Engineered Rocket, Best Design, and the Egg Drop Challenge—where rockets had to land without cracking an egg.

The biggest challenge was the time limit—building and launching in one day meant thinking fast and working efficiently. If we did it again, we would allow more time for planning and testing. Despite this, the event was a huge success! We learned a lot about aerodynamics, problem-solving, and teamwork. It was a great experience, and we can't wait to do it again!' - Elis

'During the competition, we attempted to compete in the challenge of making an egg survive the competition. Mine, however, did not work. Next time, to improve, I would cover my egg in a sponge, which will reduce the impact. However, my rocket did manage to go the highest out of all of the others. Taking part in this competition broadened my knowledge of rockets, and I found it very interesting how they worked. I especially enjoyed learning specifically about how the water rockets worked and how pressure caused them to fire.' - Owen


## **Highlands orchestra performs at Cecil Sharp House**


writing, stunning artwork, and thought-provoking videos to innovative designs.


This unforgettable experience not only strengthened their technical skills but also cemented their passion for a future in technology.








## **Delicious cheesecake competition**

- Pay via the online form. Type in N21 1QQ and this will find Highlands Secondary School.
- Once payment is made return the paid wish list form to the librarian for order completion and final collections. (You must List the names of the books you have purchased so that the librarian knows which books you have paid for).

#### Buying books at the fair

- On a sealed envelope place your child's name and form (e.g. Sarah Michaels 7RTS), ensure the exact cash amounts for the books being purchased in house is correct, as change will not be given.
- Click on the TEEN section books online, referencing book titles and pricing write the name of the book clearly and the age group of the book.
- Forms can also be collected from the Library and brought home. All forms must be submitted to the librarian no later than 2nd April, by 11.15am
- Cash and forms for book purchases must be submitted together to ensure that items from the wish list arrive in a timely manner, if they are needing to be ordered.




