Dear parents and carers,

On Monday this week the school marked Remembrance with a two minute silence and the Last Post played across the school, we also held Remembrance assemblies for all year groups led by Ms Halstead. Each year our school community stops to pay their respects to those who gave their lives fighting in the British armed forces and to thank those still in uniform today.

On Wednesday evening this week we held our sixth form open evening. From 5pm-9pm the school was full, with over 900 people here. We welcomed families with students in year 11 at Highlands and families from other schools, all learning about our sixth form. We are proud of the journey our sixth form has been on, with over 240 students joining us last year and results in the top 10% of schools nationally by progress.

In our newsletter this week there are lots of other events to read about, but I would draw your attention to our house captains and strand captains who were appointed this week and received their badges. And, please read about our under 16 girls' football team who progressed to the next round of the English schools national cup - well done!


HPFA presents Music Bingo!




STEM Dorado - New STEM magazine out now!




Remembrance Day


Year 9 'Dwellings' title pages




Highlands Book of the month - November



Student medical needs

If your child needs to take regular medication in school, please fill out the following <u>Medicines Consent</u> Form to give the school consent to administer medication to your child. All medications that are kept in school must be stored in the medical room. We recently sent out a <u>medical and allergy survey</u> to all parents - thank you to all those who have completed this - if you haven't already done so, please can this be completed as soon as possible so we can update our records.

Mental health

We are continuously working hard to improve our understanding as a community of mental health, to enable us to provide the best possible outcomes for the young people in our lives. If you are ever concerned that your child is at risk due to very poor mental health please inform the school. You can also contact one of these numbers to seek support from a specialist. The Crisis line is there to offer guidance if your child may be having suicidal thoughts and is possibly in immediate danger.
