Dear parents and carers,

This week's newsletter is packed with the achievements of our students and events that have been taking place at Highlands. Below you can read about the students who have been selected as house form representatives for their houses, students involved in STEM projects and activities, and students (above) who have participated in the 'Write2Speak' programme. You can also read about the results of our year 8 inter house football competitions and our sports teams, who have been successfully competing against other schools in netball and football. I was pleased to present more headteacher's awards this week to students who have gone the 'extra mile' or excelled at school, you can read about this on page 8.

I would like to remind you of the early finish on Monday (16th) next week and the late start on Tuesday (17th). This is because Monday evening is our open evening. Highlands had more applications in total last year from year 6 families than any other school in Enfield and our open evening is a very busy event that runs from 4:30pm - 9:30pm. Over 1,300 guests will join us at open evening, and we still have families on waiting lists to come to the event. Our staff have to get the building ready, and either after the evening or the next morning tidy up and take down displays ready for teaching to recommence. Over 150 students have volunteered to be tour guides on Monday, thank you to all of them.

On Thursday (19th) and Friday (20th) next week are our DARE Days. Four times a year we collapse the school timetable and all students and staff take part in trips and events that are designed to broaden our students' knowledge and experiences and to build character through team building and other activities. We do this so that our trips and visits are not the preserve of a small group of students who might be the quickest to sign up or who can afford them, we want all of our students to have the same experiences over the 16 DARE Days they take part in at Highlands from years 7-13. Much like our Wednesday afternoon Ed-Extra programme for years 7 and 8, our DARE Days are an entitlement, not a privilege.



Along with the newsletter this week we are sharing our special feature newsletter celebrating Black History Month. Please take the time to read it.

I would also like to draw your attention to the information on page 9 of this week's newsletter about our school performance this year. Our ambition at Highlands is to be an example of excellence in all that we do. One aspect of our school that we are focusing on this year is the performing arts and we are pleased to announce the return of our school show. Unlike in previous years when the show was performed at school, we have hired the Millfield Theatre in Enfield and we have a professional tech and support crew to help us with it. We will be performing the musical 'Matilda!'. Any students who want to perform, sing, dance or learn about tech and backstage support should come to the main hall after school on Tuesday next week and the performing arts team will explain to students how they can get involved. We are confident that this will be the best performance in the history of Highlands and we can't wait to get started. Auditions will take place after half term and the show will take place in July 2024.

On the uniform and jewellery front I would like to redraw your attention to the information we shared last week about bracelets. Bracelets are not allowed at Highlands, this has been the case since before I became headteacher here in 2018. A number of students have been wearing them since the summer. We ask that they are removed before Monday morning. Please see the information on page 18 of the newsletter for further details of why we have made this decision.

Finally this week, I want to acknowledge the traumatic effect that the Hamas attack on Israel has had on so many people, including members of our school community. We are working on some resources that we will share with students but, in the meantime, our thoughts are with those who have been affected and to those in the UK who feel unsafe as a result of the fallout from the attack.

- Emma Smith 11RKM: Awarded for assisting a friend to call emergency services when a fellow student was in need.










Highlands' Matilda production at the Millfield Theatre



Higher and Degree Apprenticeships Awareness Assembly

We were delighted to welcome Georgina Anyadike from Employability & Careers Education Development Trust to deliver a DfE funded (ASK) Apprenticeship Awareness Assembly to our 13 students.





Students were given an overview of modern apprenticeships, focussing on those at Higher and Degree level where the

apprentice gains a degree level qualification without the need to pay fees; as is the case with a traditional university-based degree. Students who take this route also gain invaluable experience of the role over the 4-5 years apprenticeship whilst also earning a salary.

2024 is set to be an exciting year for apprenticeships and it is vital that students are kept informed of the possibilities and inspired to think about alternative post 18 options.

There are now more than 670 high quality apprenticeships in a wide range of roles. This includes degree apprenticeships in nursing, engineering, law, and science. The first ever NHS doctor apprenticeship will all start from September 2024.

Komboskini bracelet - update

Thank you to our Greek Orthodox families who have recently contacted us regarding our uniform policy around religious jewellery.

We have seen an increase recently in the number of students wearing threaded bracelets at school, with some students wearing multiple bracelets. Both students and parents have informed us these are of religious significance. At Highlands bracelets are not allowed under our uniform policy. This has been the case for a long time, meaning that this feature of our uniform policy was in place when all of our families chose to send their children to Highlands.

However, in order to ensure our uniform policy is both consistent and supportive of religious customs within the Orthodox faith we have taken the time to consult with Father Demetrianos Melekis, parish priest of the Twelve Apostles Church in Hertfordshire.

Father Demetrianos was able to provide helpful insight into the matter, and clarified for us that the main symbol of the faith in the Greek Orthodox church is the cross to be worn around the neck, as this is blessed during baptism. Whilst there are many other items of jewellery that may have a cross or icon on them, these are worn in addition to the cross. Father Demetrianos confirmed that whilst the traditional komboskini bracelet can be worn as a symbol of one's devotion to prayer, these do not need to be worn at all times.

As a multi-faith school we have adopted an inclusive approach to supporting our students' religious beliefs and take the time to educate ourselves when writing our policies. We work hard to establish a fair balance, and we amended our uniform policy last year to allow for an item of religious jewellery to be worn on a chain under the shirt. Where students are of a faith where the main symbol of faith is a different form of jewellery, we have made allowances to support this.

With this in mind, and under the guidance of the Greek Orthodox church, we do request that all threaded bracelets be removed, as students are able to demonstrate their commitment to their faith by wearing a cross on a chain, in line with our uniform policy. Influenza Vaccine (Flu)

- Flu can be an unpleasant illness and can cause serious complications.
- Vaccinating your child will help protect more vulnerable family and friends by preventing the spread of flu.
- Enfield Immunisation Team are offering this vaccine to all children from years 7 to year 11.

You can decide between two different types of flu vaccines:

- Nasal Flu Spray Completely pain free. Contains porcine gelatine.
- Flu Injection The injection will be administered at school. Does NOT contain porcine gelatine.




Highlands School is launching an alumni network!
