With a focus on academic excellence, personal growth and extracurricular activities, the sixth form team is dedicated to supporting each student's unique aspirations and goals.





ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

A level entry requirements:

A minimum of 6 grades 9-4 with at least 3 grades 9-6 at GCSE including maths (grade 5) and English (grade 5) and a grade B/6 in each of the subjects to be studied at A level.

BTEC entry requirements:

A minimum of 6 grades 9-3 with at least 3 grades 9-4 at GCSE including maths (grade 4) and English (grade 4).

Two A levels and 1 BTEC requirement:

A minimum of 6 grades 9-3 with at least 3 grades 9-4 at GCSE including maths (grade 4) and English (grade 4). The entry requirements for the A level they want to pursue.

One A level and 2 BTECs requirement:

A minimum of 6 grades 9-3 with at least 3 grades 9-4 at GCSE including maths (grade 4) and English (grade 4). The entry requirements for the A level they want to pursue.







EMPOWERED WOMEN IN STEM

Eleanor McHale and Shreya Deb have been selected to be part of The Empowered Women in STEM Programme. This four-month programme, which launched in November, will mean both Eleanor and Shreya will be mentored by senior female scientists and directors from several global STEM companies such as Pfizer, BP, Dyson, Colt, AWS (Amazon) and UCB.

The programme:

- Prepares young females' employability skills for the start of their STEM careers.
- Enables young females to network with global STEM employers in-person and online.
- Increases the self-efficacy of young females in STEM.
- Empowers young females to be valued members and bold leaders of the STEM community.

Our students attended the launch of The Empowered Women In STEM, here is what Eleanor had to say.

'Shreya and I attended the 'Empowered Women In STEM' launch event held at the BP office head office. The day started - to our delight - with complimentary pastries and coffee. We were then given an inspiring talk by BP's VP of Digital Disciplines, Joanne Legge, about her successful 33 year career that followed a less typical route, by starting with an apprenticeship. The day continued with networking and team building activities in the teams that we will be working with to complete our STEM projects. Over the course of four months, we will be working on a roll-out scheme for the Ebola vaccine. The afternoon consisted of a panel discussion with representatives from Pfizer, Dyson and Colt. Kasia Dragun (a vibration engineer) at Dyson spoke about silencing motors by making them guieter for dog and human interpretation of sound. One of Pfizer's study start-up directors, Poonam Ahluwalia, spoke about her role in coordinating global clinical trials for oncology drugs. Overall, it was a valuable experience, getting to network with experts in their fields and learning about the wide range of lesser known STEM careers. We are both excited to continue with the programme and look forward to lectures and meetings with our mentors.'

HIGHER AND DEGREE APPRENTICESHIPS AWARENESS ASSEMBLY

We were delighted to welcome Georgina Anyadike from Employability & Careers Education Development Trust to deliver a DfE funded (ASK) Apprenticeship Awareness Assembly to our year 13 students.

Students were given an overview of modern apprenticeships, focusing on those at Higher and Degree level where the apprentice gains a degree level qualification without the need to pay fees; as is the case with a traditional university-based degree. Students who take this route also gain invaluable experience of the role over the 4-5 years apprenticeship whilst also earning a salary.

2024 is set to be an exciting year for apprenticeships and it is vital that students are kept informed of the possibilities and inspired to think about alternative post 18 options.

There are now more than 670 high quality apprenticeships in a wide range of roles. This includes degree apprenticeships in nursing, engineering, law, and science. The first ever NHS doctor apprenticeship will all start from September 2024.




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DARE DAYS - YEAR 12

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CHEMISTRY IN ACTION TRIP

Mrs Smith, Ms Lakhani and 44 year 12 chemistry students braved the cold to attend a day of fascinating lectures in London. The topics covered were interesting and diverse. In one talk students learned how chemical forensic science is used to tackle the problem of waste dumping by analysing the chemical composition of the waste to see where it has originated. This enables the police to track down and prosecute the culprits. They heard how nuclear science, despite its negative press, can be used positively to help us to achieve net zero. Students learnt that 10 mg of uranium could power a lightbulb for a week which is impressive when you consider that 10mg of fossil fuel would only keep it glowing for 9 seconds! Nuclear chemistry is also being trialled to cure cancers and to explore outer space using nuclear space batteries.

Another lecturer taught students about the difficulties of preparing and transporting antivenom for snake bites given that 50 attacks occur across the world every five minutes. Since the countries with the worst healthcare systems commonly had the most venomous snakes, companies have been researching the creation of antibodies using horses. These are much more stable at room temperature and thus much easier to transport and store.

In addition to these students also had a lecture from an AQA Chief Examiner describing the common ways that students lose marks and tips on how to avoid doing it yourself, and also a question and answer session from three young chemists describing the choices that they had made and the routes that they had taken to the careers that they were now enjoying.

All in all, it was an entertaining and informative day which was enjoyed by all.




CHEMISTRY IN ACTION TRIP



'I particularly enjoyed the lecture about nuclear science, and how an isotope of plutonium produced as nuclear waste decays into an isotope of astatine that can be used as a radioactive source to power spacecraft batteries. I didn't know about this potential use for nuclear waste before, a topic that really interests me, so I found it very engaging.' - Francis Gelling

'My favourite lecture was Nuclear Science by Tim Gregory. It increased my interest in nuclear chemistry and the different uses of nuclear energy to solve some of the greatest challenges facing the world today. It talked about the production of nuclear energy in a compelling and understandable way, it also discussed innovative and safe ways to recycle and dispose of nuclear waste through geological exposure. Furthermore, it spoke about nuclear medicine research such as the use of actinium-225, made into a 'molecular key' to bind to cancer cells and ultimately destroy them, this piqued my interest. It also discussed space exploration, how nuclear energy powered many explorations to space e.g. journey to the moon, Voyager I and II and many more. I learned different career paths chemistry can lead me to and different ways scientists use chemistry to make scientific discoveries.' - Emelina Koureta

NORTH LONDON HEAT AND POWER PROJECT WORK INSIGHT

A group of year 12 students had the opportunity to visit the North London Heat and Power project, by participating in group activities and learning about careers related to STEM subjects as well as construction, engineering and waste infrastructure.

The North London Heat and Power Project is replacing a 50-year-old energy from waste facility at the Edmonton EcoPark. The new energy recovery facility (ERF) will be able to process up to 700,000 tonnes of waste each year which cannot be recycled and will provide electricity to the national grid and heat to a local district heat network. The project is being developed and managed by Acciona, one of the largest global energy companies operating exclusively in renewable technologies.

Students were also given a tour of the Acciona offices and heard directly from professionals in the different departments including HR, legal, finance, marketing, engineering, and operations.


