Dear parents and carers,

We are remembering one of our former students, Rae Durman, this week. Rae died over the Christmas break. Rae was a student with us from year 7 to year 13, leaving us last summer. She was a wonderful student and Ms Brown, her form tutor for many years, has written this tribute to her:

Rae attended Highlands School from year 7 until she graduated from year 13 last year. She was a valued member of the Oak House form group and we are honoured to have shared our school community with her.

Rae was a memorable student for so many good reasons. She had an enormous amount of positive energy and would bounce through the school with enthusiasm every day. She really enjoyed the performing arts subjects and was a talented dancer. She also had a lovely singing voice and we would always ask her to be in the school shows. Rae was a wonderful advocate for sport, and she loved the annual school sports day. She was really interested in studying English at A level along with religious studies and sociology. She was always looking to have a deeper understanding of the world and its people, and she approached her studies with an inquisitive mind.

Her teachers in religious studies and sociology remember her engagement and passion for debate, Rae always had a strong opinion to put forward - often from a feminist perspective! - but always with logical and considered reasons. Never shy to contribute, Rae role modelled what her teachers always looked for in a deep and philosophical thinker. However, Rae was also practical and pragmatic and enjoyed finding solutions to problems that others could not see. Rae will be missed by everyone who taught her and studied alongside her. She burned so bright and will be remembered as a true ray of light that brightened our days and made us smile.


Collaboration and showcase event

- Once payment is made return the paid wish list form to the librarian for order completion and final collections. By returning the form it will allow us to know what books you have paid for.









KS3:Paper Butterflies by Lisa Heathfield




