## Year 7 parents/carers and student feedback surveys

Throughout this academic year we will, one year group at a time, be asking students and parents / carers to complete surveys to allow us to gather feedback on various aspects of our students' educational experience at Highlands. Our year 7 surveys were carried out before Christmas, we have collated the results and put actions in place to improve our school and now we are sharing them with you.

Firstly, thank you to those who filled out the survey. You gave up your time to tell us about our school and we have made changes to improve it as a result.

We were pleased and grateful that so many of you responded to this survey and we are delighted with the positive feedback we received. 96% of parents who completed the questionnaire said that they would recommend Highlands school to other parents considering a secondary school for their child.

In response to the feedback we received we have been able to implement the following changes.

Safeguarding				
Students stated they would have liked to receive more information on which teachers they could speak to if something is troubling them.	Updated posters have been displayed around the school which display pictures of the executive safeguarding team, including behaviour mentors and the school counsellor.  We are considering including a list of teachers' names into the student planner so students are aware of who they can talk to if needed.			
Extra curricular act	ivities, clubs and trips			
Students are unclear how the allocation of Ed-Extra activities are decided.	Ed-Extra activities are allocated by asking students to pick a first, second and third choice via a Google form. We deliver a range of activities including boxing, samba and coding. We do our very best to ensure all students that complete the Google form, end up with one of their choices. At the end of each term we listen to students' feedback in order to make improvements for the next set of Ed-Extra sessions.			
A small group of students identified that they wanted more information about DARE days earlier, they didn't want to be in the same groups and wanted to be off site for at least one of the DARE days.	After each DARE day we ask students to complete an evaluation form in order to improve the next set of activity days. We have taken this feedback on board by sending out the itinerary for the summer in February, we have spoken to trip leads about activity groupings and we can guarantee for the next two DARE days at least one of the days will be off site.			



More information about clubs and activities for parents and carers	In January you would have received the newsletter and an email stating the wide range of extra curricular activities that we will be offering after school for the rest of the academic year.
Lack of support from school for students wanting to complete homework in school (club).	Next term the new homework strategy will be launched and all parents and carers will receive information on this and how to best support their child when completing independent learning. On 19th February a year 7 / 8 homework club started that students can attend in the DT computer area. This club is a drop-in session and will not take the place of a detention unless agreed to by the head of year.
Year 7	induction
A map of the school would have helped students in their first couple of weeks of being at Highlands.	We will be introducing a map into the year 7 transition packs for the new year 7s and we are looking into having the map printed in the front of the planner.
Scho	ol dining
Students had concerns regarding the price of items in the canteen as well as not having a cold meal deal that they could buy and eat outside in the playground.	We will be incorporating the menus and costing of items in the new year 7 transition pack. Prices and menus will be in the newsletter each half term - including changes in prices or what a meal deal includes. We have been working with the school's catering company and from 16th January 2024 they launched a cold meal deal offer for all students.
Not enough choices of different food in the canteen.	There are lots of discussions with the school catering company in order to introduce more culturally diverse cuisines every half term. Each house will be in charge of promoting the cuisine.
Scho	ol toilets
Some students felt uncomfortable using the same toilets as the rest of the school.	At lunch times year 7 have sole use of the toilets already.
	At break time, in response to this feedback, we launched a new toilet system, which started on Thursday 29th February. There is now a Key Stage 3 toilet, so year 7s only use the toilets with year 8 and 9. We also now have a member of staff outside the toilet to make sure it is not overcrowded.
	The single cubicle disabled toilets are available for use at break and lunch as well.



House system and	d student leadership
There are not enough house /department competitions throughout all subjects.	From September department competitions have been taking place but we will ensure that each department facilitates at least two department competitions each academic year.  School wide competitions will continue to be planned throughout the rest of the academic year.
Students want a place or someone that they can speak to if they want to make a suggestion about lessons, lunch etc.	We have ensured this year that all forms in the school have at least one form representative in order to be the spokesperson for the class. They can bring any issues raised to the house council for discussion. We have made lots of changes already following suggestions of form reps including increasing the number of basketball nets and teams, introducing a Highlands reusable water bottle (being launched soon) and holding a culture and heritage non uniform day.
More acknowledgment of the pupils to reach a set goal for house points, and to also encourage academic achievement.	We have created award certificates for academic excellence and most improved students - not only recognising DARE values but also academic achievement. The first set was given out after the year 9 mid-year assessments. The year 7 awards will be given out in the next few weeks.

We thank you for your continued support in making Highlands School a safe, caring and respectful community and a beacon of educational excellence.



## Social enterprise success!

#### Great news, our social enterprise group - "High-Dr8" makes it through to the next heat!

Following weeks of preparation, the year 9 social enterprise group, took part in a virtual zoom meeting to welcome their business mentor, Griff Tanner of Cirrus Logic digital solutions, who will be supporting them as they launch their identified issue to reduce plastic waste (single use water bottles) and replace with a 2-in-1 water filling station, dispensing reusable water bottles in school.



Students had prepared a comprehensive and realistic business plan and were able to answer questions put forward to them. The meeting was also assisted by Lewis Scott, Education Coordinator for Social Enterprise Academy, who commented on the remarkable progress, commitment, and passion to fostering this change the students demonstrated during the live meeting. The session also provided the students with valuable insights and offered a fresh perspective.

We are proud to announce, the students left an indelible mark on the mentor, earning themselves a coveted spot in the semi-final which will take place in front of four "Dragons" at the Dugdale Centre, where they will need to present a pitch with the potential of financial backing but also propelling these students into a promising future of entrepreneurship.

## Apprenticeship assemblies

We were delighted to welcome Georgina Anyadike from Apprenticeship Support & Knowledge (ASK), the leading organisation in the education sector working with schools to ensure that more individuals can access the benefits of apprenticeships.



Year 11 students had an awareness assembly as an introduction to apprenticeships and to help them discover the different pathways they could take and learn about the different levels and requirements, whereas year 12 students had a separate assembly learning about modern apprenticeships, focusing on those at Level 5 where the apprentice gains a degree level qualification without the need to pay fees as is the case with a traditional university-based degree. Students who take this route also gain invaluable experience of the role over the 4-5 years apprenticeship whilst also earning a salary.





## Virtual work experience opportunity

The virtual work experience (WEX) is now available this month. Students will have the opportunity to delve into Obstetrics and Gynaecology or Paediatric and Dental Surgery, gaining invaluable insights into these specialised fields. The medical programme spans over six months, while the dental is four months, offering a wide range of specialties to explore.

#### In the heart of every soul





#### Student medical needs
