


# **Zero Carbon Schools menu challenge: Pioneering eco-friendly dining**

We are delighted to bring you an exciting update from our enterprising year 8 students who are at the forefront of the Zero Carbon Schools challenge, an initiative led by the Green Schools Project. This programme empowers students to spearhead projects aimed at reducing carbon emissions within schools, a vital step in our commitment to environmental stewardship.



Since the beginning of last term, 37 of our Year 8 pupils have been gathering weekly to brainstorm and develop actionable plans to reduce our school's carbon footprint. Their focus has been on understanding and mitigating the main sources of carbon emissions associated with school activities, specifically in the areas of food, energy, travel, and purchasing.



The students have made significant strides in their projects and are now actively exploring practical avenues for decarbonisation within our school. Their first major challenge involved devising a zero-carbon

lunch menu, a task that they approached with creativity and enthusiasm. All groups presented a range of innovative ideas, and we extend our congratulations to each participant for their hard work and imaginative contributions.

The menus were judged based on their presentation, the effectiveness of teamwork, and the appetising nature of the dishes proposed. Our runners-up, Saina, Isabel, Lexie, Molly, April, and Alecha, impressed with their offerings of fried tofu katsu curry and vegan butternut squash soup, followed by a dessert of apple pie with ice cream. Their emphasis on using locally sourced and minimally processed ingredients was particularly commendable.

The winning team, composed of Leo and Aaron, proposed a mouth-watering main course of soya-based meatballs in a tomato sauce accompanied by a fresh salad, with all vegetables sourced locally. For dessert, they suggested pancakes served with local honey, highlighting the potential for delicious, eco-friendly school meals.

Following a spirited presentation, our runner-up team's menu captivated Marva from our canteen staff, who expressed enthusiasm about implementing their innovative ideas soon. This is a wonderful testament to the practical impact of the Zero Carbon Schools challenge and the pivotal role our students play in driving our school towards a more sustainable future.

We are incredibly proud of the initiative and dedication shown by all the students involved. These young environmental champions are not only learning about the importance of sustainability but are also actively contributing to meaningful change. # Online safety workshops

As part of our stay safe curriculum, all students will have the opportunity to engage with workshops around online safety, starting from Monday 22nd April 2024. Supporting pupils with their digital literacy and positive decision making, online safety sessions inform and empower with the knowledge and tools of how to keep safe online.

On Monday 22nd April, years 7-10 will each have an assembly style workshop run by ECP, an external organisation who specialise in delivering safeguarding support to schools.

Sessions include the following at an age-appropriate level:

- Online reputation
- Live streaming
- Gambling
- Online challenges
- Sending Nudes and semi-nudes
- Harmful content and behaviour
- Pornography: the risks and harms \*from year 9

Year 11 and sixth form will also have the opportunity to engage with online safety training in the form of an online webinar. This will be accessible to these students for a four-week window to allow them to access the content without missing any curriculum time, given the upcoming exam season.

As well as student sessions, we will also be offering parents and carers the opportunity to watch a parental training session around online safety also. We hope our parents, carers and students find this opportunity helpful in understanding how to best keep themselves and others safe online.






# Year 11 yearbook and hoodie




### KS3: The Princess Bride by William Goldman

Beautiful, flaxen-haired Buttercup has fallen for Westley, the farm boy, and when he departs to make his fortune, she vows never to love another.

So, when she hears that his ship has been captured by the Dread Pirate Roberts (no survivors) her heart is broken. But her charms draw the attention of the relentless Prince Humperdinck who wants a wife and will go to any lengths to have Buttercup.

So starts a fairy tale like no other, of fencing, poison, true love, hate, revenge, giants, bad men, good men, snakes, spiders, chases, escapes, lies, truths, passion and miracles, and a damn fine story.





### KS4: The Catcher in the Rye by J D Salinger


The Catcher in Rye is the ultimate novel for disaffected youth, but it's relevant to all ages. The story is told by Holden Caulfield, a seventeen-year-old dropout who has just been kicked out of his fourth school. Throughout, Holden dissects the 'phony' aspects of society, and the 'phonies' themselves: the headmaster whose affability depends on the wealth of the parents, his roommate who scores with girls using sickly-sweet affection. Lazy in style, full of slang and swear words, it's a novel whose interest and appeal comes from its observations rather than its plot intrigues (in conventional terms, there is hardly any plot at all). Salinger's style creates an effect of conversation, it is as though Holden is speaking to you personally, as though you too have seen through the pretences of the American Dream and are growing up unable to see the point of living in, or contributing to, the society around you. Written with the clarity of a boy leaving childhood, it deals with society, love, loss, and expectations without ever falling into the clutch of a cliche.

There will be fully funded summer school opportunities for year 12 this summer.


### There are two summer school opportunities:

It will take place online from 29th July to 2nd August, with a funded trip to Imperial's South Kensington campus on 14th August. These summer schools focus on academic enrichment and university preparedness, and support the supra-curricular engagement that highly selective universities such as Imperial College London look for in student applications.


### Willow half term winners

Will they hold on to their title and be crowned 2023-2024 house champions?










