Dear parents and carers,

Today is the final day of the half term. Once we return to school, on 1st June, we will enter what is always the busiest half term of the year with trips, performances, special events and celebrations taking place. Below I have set out some of those key events, please make a note of them. I would particularly like to draw your attention to a couple of dates:

**Wednesday 8th July.** This year, Highlands is 25 years old. On the afternoon of Wednesday 8th July we are having a celebration event. Students will be released from school at 12:40pm. There will be a formal event in the main school hall followed by a three-hour summer festival on the terrace and field at the back of the school. We will be inviting you to apply for tickets to the festival, we hope many of you will join us celebrating 25 years of Highlands!

**Monday 20th July.** This is the final day of the academic year. This will be a home learning day, work will be uploaded to the Google Classroom for students for their lessons. No students will be on site. The reason for this is, at the end of our PFI contract, the school and the local authority identified works that need to be carried out to the school, for example two of our three boilers are old and need repairs. A different, and significant piece of work, involves the installation of flood management works around the school site and digging up the school field in order to install adequate drainage. All these works are significant and need to be completed before the autumn. For this reason, contractors will be on site from Saturday July 18th and we cannot use the school from this point. Although Friday 17th July will be the final day of the year that students will be physically in school, it will be a full school day, rather than the midday finish we usually have on the final day of term.

Please also ensure:

- No tracksuit bottoms/joggers
- No masks
- No sliders/crocs
- No **club** football/rugby tops
- No clothing showing persons mid drift/ too short (eg skirt or shorts.)
- No items with inappropriate/offensive/defamatory language.



**This is not a non-uniform day or a day for students to just turn up in their hoodie or tracksuit. The clothing they wear should be linked to their culture or heritage.**

## Library book return reminder

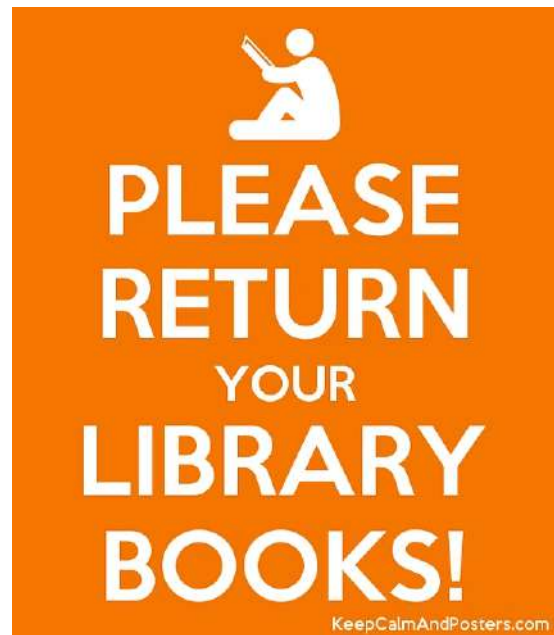
To all our year 11 students, as you finish your final year at Highlands School, please return all library and textbook loans.

### Notifying the school of student appointments

If your child has an appointment scheduled during school hours, please ensure you notify us promptly by emailing [postbox@highlearn.uk](mailto:postbox@highlearn.uk) for years 7-11 and [sixthform@highlearn.uk](mailto:sixthform@highlearn.uk) for years 12-13 or by phoning us on the day of the appointment.

Your notification must include the date of the appointment and the exact time the student needs to leave school. Where possible, please also attach or provide proof of the appointment to the email.

To ensure your child is released smoothly from their lesson, please write a clear note on the appropriate day of your child's student planner, indicating the time they need to leave class. Students must show this planner note to their teacher to be excused from the lesson. They will then proceed to the school reception to officially sign out before being released to meet you at your pre-arranged location. Many thanks for your cooperation with this.

### Lunch money

**Programme overview:** SAFE Abridged is a 6-week family programme for parents/carers of autistic children, delivered in a small supportive group programme where parents/carers can step back, reflect, and share ideas with others.

- Understand your child's strengths and needs
- Think about family life and relationships and what supports wellbeing
- Build practical resources to overcome barriers and cope with challenges
- Leave with strategies you can try at home between sessions

#### Facilitators:

Claire Collins – Lead Autism Educational Psychologist & Family Therapy Practitioner  
Marsha Walton – Parent Support Advisor, Enfield Advisory Service for Autism (EASA)

#### Format:

- Pre-session phone call to explain the program
- Small group context at Bell Lane (maximum 8–10 parents/carers)
- Slides and guided discussion, handouts provided where helpful
- Please try to attend all sessions (each week builds on the last)
- Follow up review session September

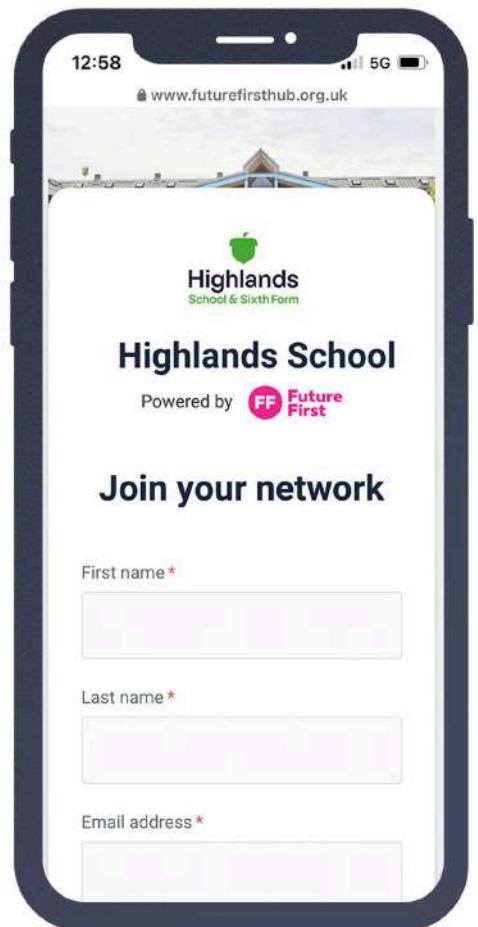
